

October 9, 2022 Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

2 KGS 5:14-17; PS 98: 1-4;2 TM 2:8-13; LK 17:11-19

Gratitude is the key to a stewardship way of life. Today's readings demonstrate the power and vital importance of gratitude in the life of the Christian disciple, for gratitude leads us to worship God who offers us salvation.



We see the power of gratitude on display in the Gospel passage from Luke after Jesus heals ten lepers. "And one of them,

realizing he had been healed, returned." Only one of the ten recognized the tremendous blessing he had received from Jesus and returned to thank him. While it's easy to feel indignant at the failure of the nine others to return and thank Jesus, how often do we fail to recognize the blessings, answered prayers, and healings (both physical and spiritual), that the Lord showers upon us, day and night?

The truth is that our very lives and every breath we take are His gift to us. But we can get so caught up in the stresses and distractions of daily life that we lose touch with this truth.

The Samaritan reacts to his gift of healing with the proper response to our loving God. Recognizing what he had just received from the Lord, he "returned, glorifying God in a loud voice; and he fell at the feet of Jesus and thanked Him." He was grateful for what God had done for him and this gratitude led to worship.

And because of this response, Jesus offered him a far more precious gift that physical healing; He offered him the gift of salvation. "Stand up and go; your faith has saved you."

Too often we hear the phrase, "Count your blessings," and write it off as nothing more than a trite saying. Today's Gospel shows us otherwise. Gratitude is powerful. It deepens our faith in God and leads us to fitting worship of Him.



St. Edward the Confessor, Feast Day, October 13

Born in 1003 at Islip, Oxfordshire to Saxon king, Ethelred III, and Norman queen, Emma. At the age of 10, he was sent to live in Normandy with an uncle after the Danish invasion, which resulted in the conquest of England and the marriage of his widowed mother to Canute, leader of the Danish invaders. Edward spent half of his life in Normandy, adopted many Norman traditions and forged lasting bonds with the Norman elite. It was said that during his time in Normandy, he abandoned his ambitions of ascending to the throne of England and preferred to "spend his time assisting at Mass and the church offices, and in association with religious." This created a lasting piety and devotion to the Church in the future English king. Edward even took a perpetual vow of chastity, which he maintained throughout his life. In 1042, the death of the last Danish king, Hardicanute, opened Edward's chance to become

king of England. With the support of the powerful Earl Godwin, Edward was popularly acclaimed king and asked to return to claim his father's throne. Edward married Godwin's daughter, Edith, on the condition that she honor his vow and that they would have no children. As king, Edward believed he was special emissary of God and protector of the Church. Edward's rule was one of peace in a time of war. He was said to be a just ruler and a peacemaker. Edward repealed taxes on his people. He used funds from his own estates and gave away large sums of money to the poor and founded churches and abbeys. The most famous of these is Westminster Abbey, which was dedicated just a week before his death in 1066. It was thanks to the monks of this abbey that their patron would become an official saint of the Catholic Church. Along with his Christian leadership, many miracles were attributed to his intervention. Edward was said to have the gift of prophesy and on several instances, he predicted the outcome of battles or royal conflicts. The most prominent is his vision of the king of Denmark, drowning when embarking to invade and conquer England. It was said that Edward saw Christ while attending Mass at Westminster. His miracles include curing an Irish cripple by carrying him on his back from his palace to Westminster Abbey on the orders of St. Peter, to whom Edward had a strong devotion. The most wellknown miracle, depicted in artwork, is the story of the ring that Edward gave to St. John the Evangelist. In the account, while dedicating a church to St. John, Edward gives a ring to a beggar who is St. John in disguise. Eventually, the ring was returned to Edward by pilgrims who were lost on the way to Jerusalem and guided back to safety by St. John. Buried at Westminster Abbey, Edward was canonized in 1161 and is the patron saint of kings, difficult marriages, and separated spouses. From Notre Dame University
